You will be taught the fine art of car control and fundamentals of vehicle dynamics. You will be able to learn the capabilities of your car and improve your driving skills at speeds that are not permitted on public roads. All drivers will be instructed on safety regulations, and general etiquette on the track. In addition to the **"Pre-Event Safety Inspection"** which the driver is required to have performed, an **"On-Site Safety Inspection"** will be performed prior to the event. A confirmation notice that explains the Safety Inspection requirements will be sent to you approximately 3 - 4 weeks before the event and after registration and payment are received and accepted. *Please ensure that you provide an accurate E-Mail address.*

PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION CAREFULLY:

- To participate, each driver must be 18 years of age or older and possess a valid driver's license that is not suspended or revoked. DRIVER'S LICENSE WILL BE CHECKED DURING TRACK REGISTRATION.
- Instructors will be assigned to students in all run groups.
- All drivers must have a helmet which is SNELL rated 95, 2000, 2005 SA or M.; Loaner helmets will not be provided.
- No Cabriolets and Convertibles allowed unless they are equipped with a fully compliant roll bar.
- Seatbelts: Equivalent restraints must be provided for driver and passenger. Factory seatbelts and 5 or 6 point harnesses are permitted. 4 point harnesses are permitted on the driver and passenger sides, if factory seatbelts are also available for use on the driver and passenger sides, at the Instructor's discretion. All types must use metal to metal buckles, be in sound condition and must be mounted using the factory mounting points and/or be mounted per the SCCA General Competition Rules.
- No SUVs/SAVs, vans, trucks, limos, open wheeled cars or any inappropriate vehicles permitted.
- Excessive tint on windows is not permitted.
- All cancellations will be assessed a \$30 fee. NO REFUND for cancellations 14 days or less before the event.
- The NY Chapter BMW CCA reserves the right to reject any applicant on event day, due to failing safety inspection, inappropriate vehicle (e.g., van, limo, truck, etc.), or for any reason pertinent to the safety of the school and participants of the school.
- The NY Chapter BMW CCA Driver School staff makes all final run group decisions.
- Any incident involving your vehicle, where damage occurs or injury occurs, the New York Chapter BMW CCA, event organizers, event instructors, and/or Pocono's Racetrack shall not be held liable.

Four European Cities in Nine Days

This New Year I had the privilege of traveling to Italy and Germany with my wife. No particular reason, just to get away from the norm. My intentions of going were purely for selfish reasons. Before we planned this trip, my wife was talking about going someplace warm, and lounging on the beach. Not for me. I would rather surround myself with cars 24/7. What better place then Italy (home of Ferrari), and Germany (home to BMW and PORSCHE). Those are the only three marques I ever want to drive for as long as I live. I have had a handful of two out of the three over the years, I am still working on getting the Italian.

If I let my wife in on my plan, she would not want to go, so I reminded her how great the shopping was in Italy. I did not have to twist her arm. So to expedia.com we went to book our trip. After we booked the trip, I showed my Mom the itinerary. She was exhausted from just reading it. Rome, Florence, Venice, and Munich in nine days. And if time allowed, I was sneaking in a trip to Stuttgart.

We landed in Rome on New Years Eve day. After checking-in, we walked around to see some sites. It was raining a bit, but the temperature was

fifty-plus, so we did not mind. This was my first trip to Italy, so a simple walk and window shopping through town was a good time. We made reservations at a local Trattoria for New Years Eve dinner. I almost exploded from the ten course meal served to us. After several glasses of champagne, my wife was doing Karaoke with the owner of the restaurant to Frank Sinatra's "New York, New York". Apparently this song is a world wide New Years Eve sensation.

The next day, we toured Ancient Rome. Seeint the sites in-peson in just surreal. And, of course, you cannot visit Rome and skip the Vatican. It was just amazing. After walking around the city most of the night, we returned to our hotel to pack for our next stop in the morning, Florence.

We took the EuroStar train from the central station in Rome to Florence. The trip was about three hours. The sites in the countryside are just gorgeous. Arriving in Florence (or Firenze) we loved it from the start. Even though it is still a somewhat major city in Italy, it is much more quiet then Rome. After checking-in, we did the usual walk around the city, and then found a good Trattoria to eat in. The next day was one museum after another. The must-see museum is the Uffizi. Inside contains thousands of sculptures and paintings, including the works of Michelangelo and Da Vinci. Michelangelo's famous David is displayed at the Galleria dell'Academia. With lines of up to four hours, seeing the life-sized replica in a piazza outside the Uffizi was good enough for me. After an eventful day of sight-seeing and shopping, it was off to bed, and off to our next destination in the morning.

We got our train ticket for Venice (or Venezia) early that morning, before breakfast. We were both starting to get a little worn out,

and are looking forward to taking a nap during the three hour train ride. I originally wanted to rent a car in Florence, and drive to Modena for the day to drool in Ferrari's hometown, then go to Venice. She just gave me an evil look, and I quickly tossed that idea.

Within the first hour of being there, we both quickly agreed that Venice was our favorite part of Italy. Venice is an island with no cars or scooters, and is just a maze of tight streets and bridges. Walking around and getting lost is part of the charm of Venice. The museums,

Next stop, Germany!

Our train left Venice at one-o-clock in the afternoon. It is a seven & a half hour train ride through Austria and into Munich. Looking out of the window at the Alps in winter made the trip feel like one hour. Getting off the train, we were starving! We grabbed two gigantic Bavarian Pretzels for about one dollar. Our hotel was walking distance from the station. After checking-in, we headed straight for the Augustiner Bierhalle, a

famous spot in Munich which serves traditional Bavarian food. I had a big piece of Weisswurst (white sausage) and some sort of German Potato soup. And of course I was washing the sausage down with a few pints of Weissbier.

The next day we headed to the north part of town where BMW is located. As you travel north, the BMW building comes into view. My wife now has a new perspective of where her car was born, not at Habberstad as she once thought. The BMW Zentrum, containing many cars from BMW past, present, and future, is closed for about two years for expansion. I saw this already in 2001, so I wasn't that upset. There is a temporary museum set up in the Olympic park across the street

from BMW. That's where a lot of interesting cars reside. After the BMW museum I wanted to rent a 1 series, and drive an hour and a half on the autobahn to Stuttgart to see some PORSCHE stuff. I got that evil look again from princess. I found a toy store near our hotel. There were five aisles from the floor to the ceiling of die cast model cars. I knew the Germans where passionate about cars, but this was insane. I bought only what

The Top 10 Lame Excuses for Not Attending Driver Schools

When considering attending a BMW CCA Driver School, there are more than a few excuses that I have heard over the years; some are valid and some are just loads of BS. I would like to distinguish between the two for you so that you can make an educated choice rather than a lame excuse.

- 1. "But I have a 7 or a Touring or it's not an M". Smell that? It's some of that BS that I mentioned before. An instructed driving school is not a full blown race where man and machine are pushed to physical limits. It is a controlled environment where you can learn to extract the performance potential of ANY CAR. All you need is a properly maintained* vehicle to participate. (*Pre-track technical inspection is required)
- 2. "I want to but I need to do big brakes and suspension." More of that happy horse....um...bull... ahem. A bone stock BMW is just fine. They are not called "The Ultimate Driving Machine" for nothing. Making changes to your car just before an event is not too smart. You should use the car you drive every day so you are not re-learning the car AND learning all that is involved with track driving... which leads me to the 3rd excuse.
- 3. "I am afraid to use my daily driver, what if something happens?": A valid concern, however I will attest that the ride up and back during a track weekend is actually the dangerous part. Unlike the road where you see people reading, eating, BSing on the cell and futzing with the radio, the track is filled with attentive, courteous drivers all intent on learning. We are all just looking to have SAFE FUN. Plus, anyone deemed a hazard is dealt with immediately. So in reality, it's safer on the track than on the Cross Island Parkway.
- 4. "What if I break something?": As for mechanical breakage, you will know the limits of your car. Drive it like you would normally and it will make it home. But bounce it off the rev limiter all day and it probably will break. Problems do arise and I can tell you having a bunch of Bimmerheads around sure does help. Most cars can be fixed on site by a crack team of concerned fellow participants. Don't want to break the car? Don't beat the snot out of it and you'll be fine.
- 5. "My insurance doesn't cover it": Most policies do, some don't. Since "High Performance Driver's Education (HPDE)" is not a timed event, it's not considered a speed contest and does not fall under the grey area of "Racing". Check with your insurance company for details. My GEICO policy only mentions racing and speed contests; there is no mention of HPDE.

- 6. "I will wear out the Brakes and Tires": There is some truth to this statement - HPDE does accelerate the wear of parts but that is something you can factor into the cost of tuition. The offset is you will learn how to use brakes more effectively and the brakes will last longer during daily use. As for tires, you wanted a new set anyway. (I am a bad influence when it comes to cars, aren't I?)
- 7. "I don't need no stinkin'school": Hate to burst your bubble but you probably do. We all do. The skills learned at an HPDE are extremely valuable on the road. A HPDE will make you a better driver no matter how good you think you are. Do you think I am wrong? Come to the track and find out how little you do know. I was one of those guys until I caught a ride with someone who *really* knows how to drive. It's awfully humbling riding shotgun with a hotshoe. The level of control they display is inspiring.
- 8. "It costs too much": I can only speak for myself but when you add it up it ain't cheap. A 2-day track weekend can run you \$500+ when you include the cost of lodging, food, gas, tolls and the school. Is it worth it? To me, it's worth every penny and then some. It's still cheaper than a good night in Vegas.
- 9. "My wife's not cool with it": Sign her up too. There are a few women that I have seen that do track their cars my wife being one of them. Sure it's a "man's sport" but ladies are more than welcome. Actually I have seen them treated with nothing but respect with an extra helping of kindness during driving sessions. So to all the guys looking for an excuse, you can go all Dr. Phil on her and be like "But honey, don't you want to share in my interests?" She'll probably love it after the initial "Oh my god I'm so nervous driving on a track" attitude wears off.
- 10. "I'm scared": Remember the day you picked up your car? You were nervous even to drive it. Now remember today, you hopped in and took off like it's no big deal? That's how you'll feel after a little reading, some laps around the track at comfortable speed and a few classroom sessions. Once you gain confidence you WILL declare this the most fun you can have with your pants on. That's a promise.

I would like to note that the opinions expressed here are mine alone. I just wanted to clear up some misconceptions that keep people from experiencing one of the best programs that your Chapter offers. I hope to see you all at one of our upcoming Driver Schools!

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
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

my suitcase would allow me to bring home.

The trip went by much too quickly. It was time to head home. On the way to the airport, at about four in the morning German time, our taxi driver was doing about 120 mph in the left lane of the autobahn. He calmly signals right and moves to the middle lane. 
