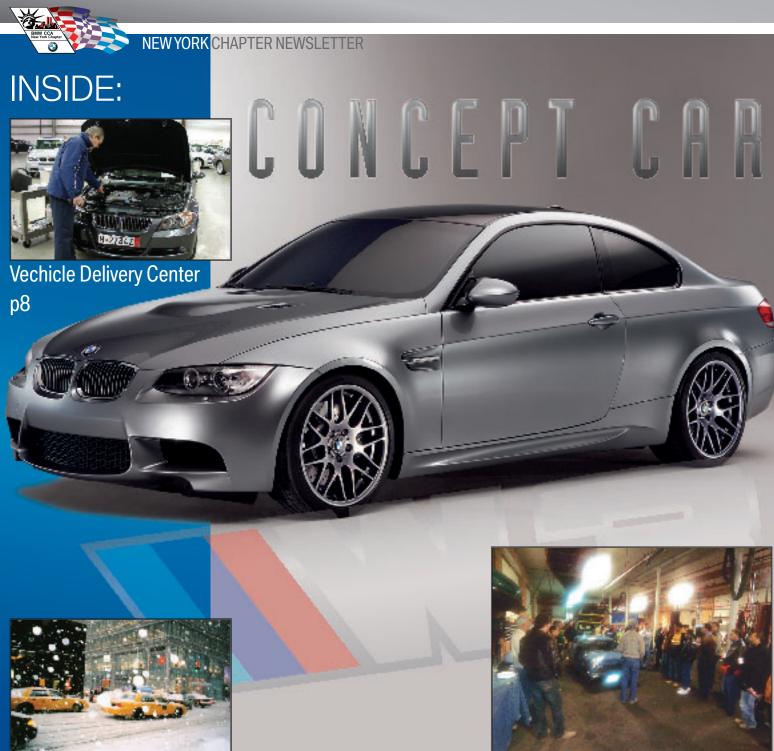
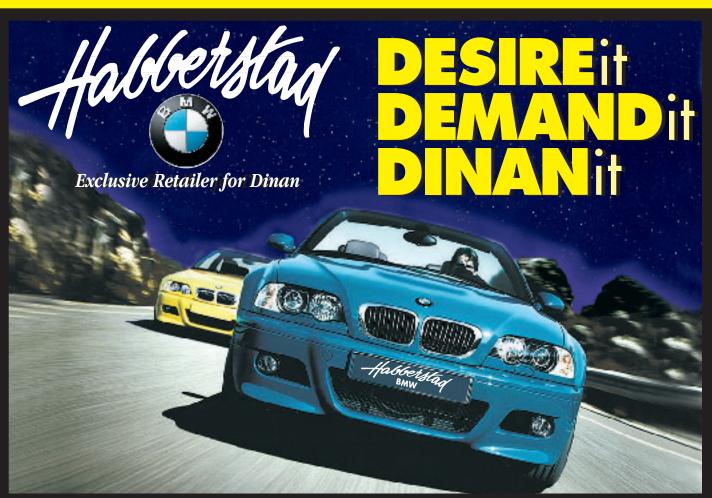

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BMW NA Vehicle Distribution Center Tour

BMW NA's Vehicle Delivery Center (VDC, previously known as the VPC), is where your BMW is or was received upon its entry into the



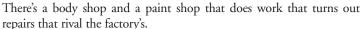
United States. Few customers get to see the VDC in action but former Board member Jonathan Spira is arranging for a private tour for New York Chapter members. The tour will take place some time in the Fall so stay tuned to Die Zugspitze for more details and registration information. Space

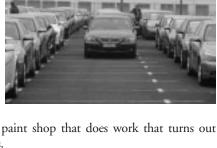
will be limited. When a ship arrives, cars are offloaded by stevedores to the first point of rest, also called the pier, which is part of the Northeast Auto Terminal. New cars are pre-cleared through U.S. Customs while en route so they move quickly from the pier to the VDC. European Delivery cars are segregated on the pier until

they are cleared by customs inspectors, who physically inspect each car. Once the cars arrive at the VDC (they are driven on a private 2.4 km road from the pier to the VDC), the

cosmoline is removed (except for European Delivery

cars, which do not have this coating). They are then are taken into inventory, washed, and moved into the facility. Each vehicle is visually inspected very carefully for damage. Damage could occur during transport and for European Delivery cars, while in use in Europe.





VDC personnel also check for any factory defects such as "airbag light on." Any campaigns are performed and the car's paper trail is reviewed.

With the anticipation of our Driving School
Program for 2007, I thought it would be very informative
and interesting to do something with safety performance and
equipment. Technology is constantly developing new and improved safety
equipment. It is extremely easy to replace parts on your car, however it is very difficult to replace body parts. With that being said, the theme for the February 10, 2007 Beach
Party at Euromeccanica was Safety. As usual, the members brought their beach chairs, lucky charms
to win door prizes and their thirst for knowledge.

BRM Motor Sports Safety Gear of Amityville, NY was our Guest Speaker. They brought out a delicious supply of safety gear for all to touch, ask questions about and purchase. Discounts were given to those that attended the party. Chris of BRM explained how to purchase a properly fitting helmet. One of the recommendations is to keep the helmet on for 10-15 minutes to ensure that you do not get a headache or experience dizziness. This was very informative since there is several people that may need to replace their out dated Snell 95 rated helmet. You can peel back the insulation inside your helmet to view the rated decal. New York Chapter BMW CCA will only accept Snell 2000 and up rated helmets for all driving events. Chris also demonstrated the head restraint device, known as the Hans Device, which BRM sells and installs. This device prohibits your head from extending beyond a certain limit if you should have any impacts. Chris also brought his track prepared E30 M3 so everyone could see the vast amount of safety equipment available as well as the proper installation.

Two days before the Beach Party, I was asked by Mike Schiffer of Euromeccanica if I knew anyone that would have a newer model Mini Cooper so he could do a comparison between the old and new. He felt this would be a great theme for his presentation because there are several people who have heard of the older Mini, but have never had the opportunity to see it in person, much less compare them side-by-side. We were able to get one of our regular autocross participants, Cheryl and Linton to bring down their Mini Cooper S.



We had a pleasant surprise — George Diaz of Alloy Wheel and Repair Specialists, one of our advertisers and last year's guest speaker at the Beach Party, showed up and donated door prizes and handouts.

Hakkapeliitta Envy

After I arrived home to Queens from the depths of suburban New Jersey during the final blast of winter here in the Big Apple for 2007, I settled in to read Satch's March Roundel column called "Let it snow, let it snow, let it snow." When Satch writes, he's usually right, but this time, he was SO right that it hurt. He railed on about SUVs and the all-weather tires crowd where he lives, bamboozled by the marketing hype, white-knuckling their way home, while Satch confidently hurtled down the road through a storm in his trusty 20-year-old 325iX with four old Hakka 10s. Yee-haa, indeed.

Wait a second! That's what I did an hour earlier, except I only have RWD/LSD, but with relatively new Hakka 2s, all mounted and pointing in the same direction.

Predictions of 6-12 inches in the New York metro region had everyone scared to death. I had to visit family on that Friday night in New Jersey. The next morning on St. Patrick's Day, I had to turn around and go back to New Jersey — again straight through midtown Manhattan. So why would I willingly risk life and limb to drive both ways during the WORST part of the storm, and then try to go back again the next morning right after Mayor Mike plowed everyone in instead of staying in a hotel like everyone else? To refine my ice racing skills, of course!

We had a very tough ice racing season; in fact we had NO ice racing season this year. The conditions never quite got to the point where an event could be held. At the time this article was written, a surrender had not yet been declared, but we all knew it was coming. There was much anticipation but ultimately disappointment as we finally accepted that Spring had arrived, and New Hampshire's lakes were melting. So where else was I going to have the opportunity to drive on icy roads and test the limits of adhesion of my favorite winter tires and my favorite brakes on my favorite winter car?

Now I've spoken of bumper-to-bumper taxi-combat before, but in the snow, there is NOTHING more entertaining on the streets of Manhattan. Think of the taxis as erratic autocross cones that are always moving. The taxi drivers are in big heavy cars that have no steering or brakes — it's almost like they're in motorboats — and that's BEFORE the first snowflake hits the ground!

There was lotsa slush on 34th Street and they were getting stuck all over the place. Spin, spin, spin... In the best of conditions, taxi drivers dribble themselves down the streets of New York City as if mirrors are for wimps, just like seatbelts, rarely concerning themselves with anything else around them. The best way to get their attention is to honk your horn, as this sound makes them

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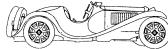

With proper snow tires, you can drive down the slushy lane with ease and confidence and get around as many taxis as you can find.

One part of driving in a snowstorm in New York City that makes it fun for me are the conversations that I imagine are occurring in the vehicles that I pass, like: "Hey, isn't that a much-maligned rear-wheel-drive mid-1980s BMW that just flew by us? Those cars are crappy in the snow. Oh, they were such yuppies back then. I'm so glad I have an SUV." Or perhaps: "Oh my gawd, that lowly passenger car just passed my sliding SUV like I was standing still" with the response from their passenger, "Honey, you ARE standing still; we're still stuck in the parking spot."

within the legal confines of a closed track event, NOT on Avenue of the Americas. Got that? NOT on Avenue the Americas: there is the get-sideways-abit maneuver, which is guaranteed to put fear into taxi

drivers and tourists alike. With rear-wheel drive, you can steer with the gas pedal. With proper snow tires, one can safely exceed the limits of adhesion slightly to demonstrate sideways motion while moving forward. This motion scares the taxis sufficiently and effectively makes them disappear.

The last time Satch risked his life in my car (truth be told, the ONLY time), I feared he was going to strangle me when we reached our destination — or at least write a very bad article about the experience, maybe something called, "Why They Hate Us". But that was on new ES100s on dry pavement. Perhaps if it were wintertime and the E28 had its Hakkas on, things would have gone differently.

Description in Brief

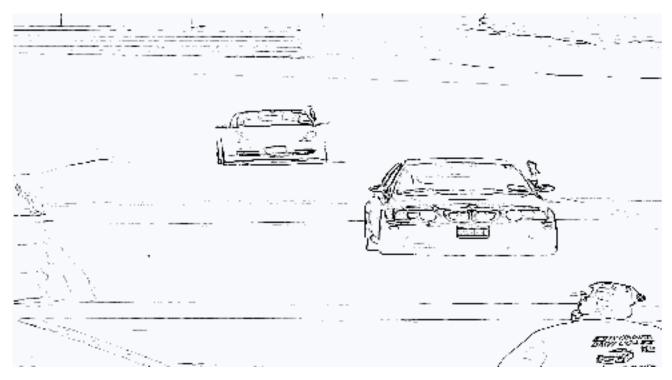

longer about the old times at Bridgehampton and then he showed me a photo I had taken at the track with everyone waving goodbye at that

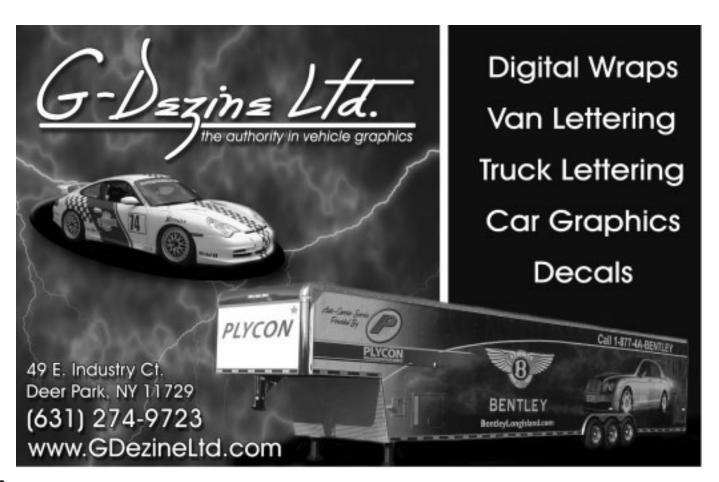

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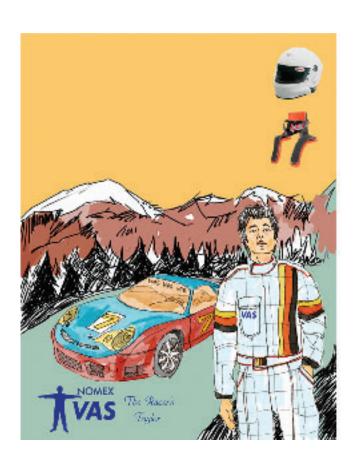
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
