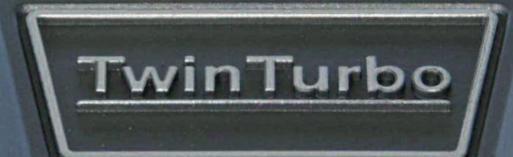

Gears Garage: Don't Brake It

Hello to all of you here in the New York area! I will be writing occasionally with some automotive tips and ideas. Today I would like to talk to you about your brakes. Do you feel you need more stopping power?

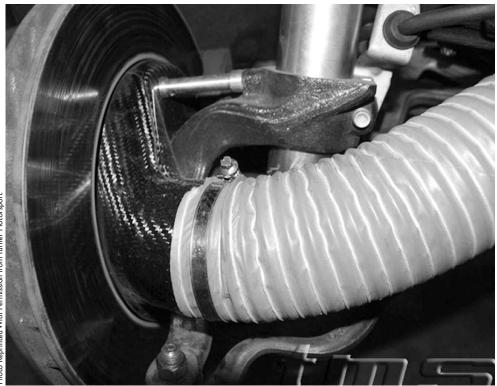
Here is a good place to start.

#1 Buy the correct PADS. This sounds very simple, but most of you may have the wrong pads for your needs.

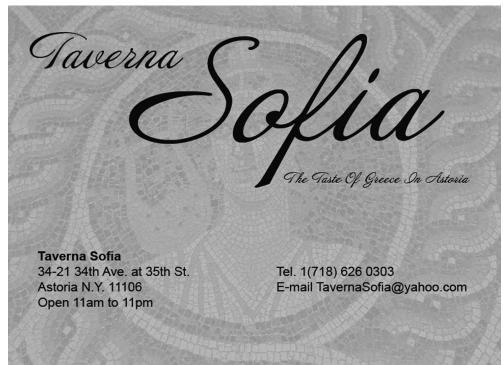
#2 Make sure you have adequate cooling t to your brakes. Again, this is a very simple idea that is overlooked by most of us and is much more important then BIG BRAKE KITS! The correct pads with good cooling will do much more for you, dollar for dollar than anything else. For most people, and this includes you track-rats like me, you are under cooled. With the wrong pads, it will § make you wish for those BIG BRAKES that you see all over the place. All you need is the correct set-up - pads and cooling. For anyone short of a full out race car set-up, this may be the best answer. You could run much better pads without any real down side - for most, a bit of noise is NOT a down side. Cooling ducts installed by the right shop are very easy to live with. An option to consider is to set them up so that you can very quickly remove the flex tubing, preventing them from cooling too much in cooler weather or in the winter. Yes, BIG BRAKE KITS are very "cool" and have their place, but they are not needed for most track day cars. Re-evaluate your needs and you may see that you could fix your braking issues in a quick, easy and cost-effective way.

#3 ALWAYS have fresh brake fluid in your brake system! If you have a newer car, say 2000 and up with ABS, in many cases there is a need to have the system "power flushed" every 2-3 brake fluid changes to get the best out of your cars' brakes. Thanks to the design of the modern ABS system, it is very hard to do a true flush every time. Your basic "push the pedal down" method does an adequate job, but not a complete job in some cases.

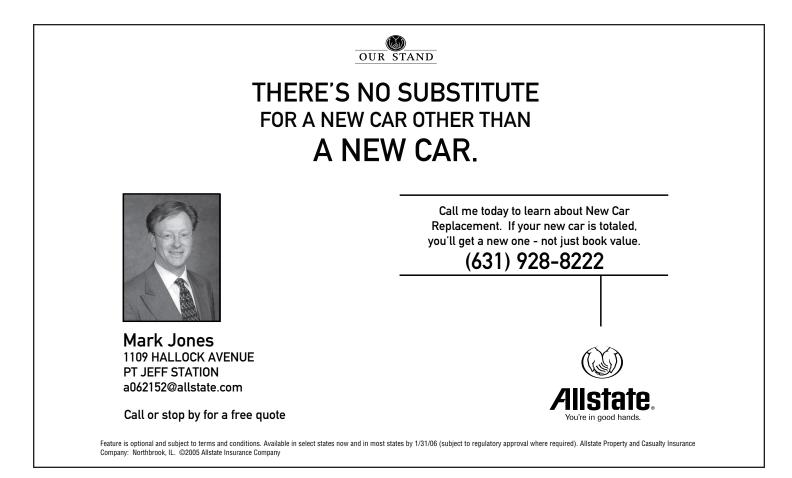

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I was not one of those kids who grew up with monsters under my bed. Most of the time if there was trouble my brother and I were in the middle of it. I find it ironic now after so many years of being monster free, I have recently

located several. They don't hang out in my house or harass my pets but they reside in my BMWs. These little monsters just sit and wait to rear their ugly heads as I turn my back or put away my tools.

A few years ago, I purchased a 1967 1600 from the original owner's family and learned the hard way of what happens to a car when you let it sit for decades. Twenty years will spoil fluids, dry rot hoses, tires, and trim, drain electrical systems, seize brakes, and cake up dirt. All in all, it's just plain nasty!

I put on a brave face and worked through most of it under the instruction of friend, Keith Kreeger. First on the list was a good exterior and interior scrub. Then all fluids had to be changed, new calipers and brake lines installed, new spark plugs, bearings repacked, filters replaced and new tires mounted and balanced. When we fired her up and tuned her, it was like

music to my ears. At 40 years old, Sabine's engine was solid and running smoothly.

> At first Sabine and I made little trips around town. As I got more confident, I decided to make a three hour trip to our local BMW Chapter's Oktoberfest. It was on this trip that one of the first monsters made an appearance. A faint squealing noise at idle turned into a very large squealing and grinding noise that drowned out the sound of the engine. Then the dreaded red electrical light that flickered sometimes, shone bright. I had a little luck on my side that day - the event was held at an import shop that worked on 02s.

The owner of the shop diagnosed the issue.....my 6-volt generator was dying. I suppose I should tell you, I'm new to this old car stuff. I didn't understand what that really meant [I bet few men do either .editor.]. I just nodded and took some mental notes. It wasn't until Ron Rinke, who asks every time I see him whether I have converted my car yet, dumbed it down for me, did I



realize I might be in over my head. I had a lot to think about as I drove home: complete a 12-volt conversion or work with what I had.

I barely made it home. Looking back on what may have been a bad decision; I chose to leave Sabine in her original 6-volt state and started searching for generator options. I visited a few local armature shops, which only crushed my naïve optimism about finding a generator. I was looking at a total refabrication job. Armature shops just don't carry new generators in stock.

Next stop the Internet. I found a used generator from a 2002 restoration shop but after installing it, discovered it also had flat spots. In the end, I went back to the import shop where it all started and they fabricated a new generator using the good parts from the two I owned and creating the other parts I needed. There is

only one word to describe the experience: expensive.

Sabine fired up quite nicely with her new generator and the red light was extinguished. It was time to hit the road again. All was well for a few months but then Sabine started to feel a little fuel starved. At first I chalked it up to operator error. Maybe I wasn't giving the car ample time to warm up? Before I could pinpoint a problem, Sabine just stopped running. I had another monster in the midst. The lights came on and it would turn over, but it would not start. Keith and I formulated a checklist of possibilities: there was enough fuel, the generator was running, the fuel pump was functioning, the battery had enough juice, the coil had enough juice, and then we found it.....no spark.

Sabine missed out on the MidAmerica '02 Fest that year but I decided to take my E46, Brigitte, and go anyway. While in Eureka Springs, Arkansas for the '02 Fest, the issue was discussed with 2002 and 1600 enthusiast, Mike Pugh. His solution was to replace the coil. The old coil probably had just enough voltage to register properly but not enough to provide spark. When I got home, I located a Volkswagen repair shop in town that carried old Beetle parts and they had one in stock. We installed the new 6-volt coil and presto, like magic, monster number three arrived! The car still would

not start. Keith and I looked things over and found the carburetor was stuck open. At this point, I honestly wanted to throw a temper tantrum.

Pressed for time for the Kansas City Art Institute's *Art of the Car Show* the following weekend, I made many trips over my lunch hours trying to locate another carburetor. Each shop would recommend me to the next shop and by the end of the week, I realized that locating a Single Solex carburetor locally was like trying to find a needle in a haystack. Running out of time, I tore apart the old carburetor, gave it another cleaning and crossed my fingers it would work long enough to make it to the show.

About 8pm on the night before the show, Keith and I reinstalled the carburetor; I turned the key and Sabine roared to life! Hell Yes! Sabine was making her debut!

A week later the evil red electrical light flickered on again. It was like a sick joke. Where were these monsters coming from!?!?! Distressed and out of funds for the year, I decided to winterize Sabine early and as I pulled her into storage, she died.

I find that bitter memories fade with time. By this spring, I was ready to conquer monster number three with a newly remanufactured Single Solex carburetor from Jaymic. Oh yeah, baby! Shiny and new!

I'm still working on electrical monster number four but I think I've narrowed it down...the generator, battery and coil are new but the red light still flickers on and off. The last piece to the puzzle is the voltage regulator so I'm on the hunt again. It's an important part but not enough to keep us off the road. Sabine and I have had quite the journey together so far and I hope as we find new roads to drive, we leave the monsters at home. They are definitely some unwanted passengers.

Meg and her BMW, Sabine, are in Perfect Harmony after the Repair is Complete.

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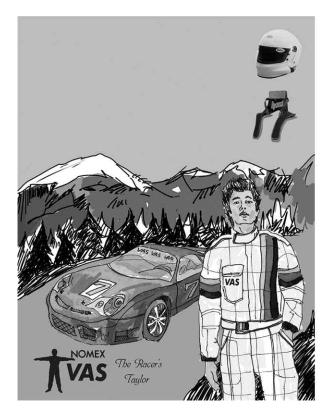
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Street Survival 2009
