Then, it was on to what I will refer to as "Daves' Garage". Dave Buchko handles product and technology communication for BMW, which means he can talk about all things BMW, from





The 22nd Annual Beach Party at EuroMeccanica

With this past winter being nothing short of "Winter" we certainly have longed for a day at the beach. The Annual Beach Party is not an actual day at the beach, but generally a social tech session with various speakers, demonstrations with Q&A and a hot buffet. We have the event in Spring's infancy with hopes that warmer weather is just around the corner where we can wash, wax and bring our cars out of hibernation. This was our 22nd Annual Beach Party hosted by Michael Shiffer at EurroMeccanica in Yonkers, NY.

EuroMeccanica was started by Michael Shiffer in 1991. EuroMeccanica's reputation has grown steadily: It is a well-known and highly-respected shop that has overseen the partial and total restoration of BMW, Mercedes, Jaguar, Rolls Royce, Bentley, Alfa Romeo, Lancia, and Daimler among other cars. It has prepared track cars for competition, driving schools and vintage racing. Repairs and maintenance are performed on modern European cars. Michael is also the tech advisor for NYBMWCCA, and like Michael, the shop's atmosphere is warm and open.

This year Mike showed us how diagnostic techniques have been modernized, but are still second fiddle to a simple visual inspection. He had on display a cylinder head from a MINI with a defect overlooked by diagnostic techniques, but a visual inspection yielded a hairline crack. He also demonstrated single and double shear bolt tensions, leading us to an undercarriage inspection of a newer BMW model, the different types of bolt pulling and pushing forces and the benefits of each style.

Another guest speaker was Matthew Brod. Matt spoke on the single greatest performance upgrade we can do for our cars, the driver itself. Matt stressed the importance of improving ourselves as the operators of our motor vehicles and the avenues to learn and hone those skills. Matt is the club's Street Survival Chair. Street Survival is a driver education program sponsored by Tire Rack and geared for drivers less than 21 years of age. Matt touched on our two-day high performance driver school at Watkins Glen International in June. He also spoke about our autocross series this May at Nassau Coliseum. These are all great driving events with large learning curves; however improving the many skills we use in everyday driving situations will make us more alert, safer, and confident behind the wheel.

Thanks to all who attended this year's event, making it another great success. I look forward to seeing everyone at the club's upcoming driving events where we all can become better drivers.



Dyno Day & BBQ




JVR Performance and 3 Nicks Auto Repair of Port Washington hosted the BMWCCA NY chapter "Dyno Day and BBQ". The morning started with flurries but soon turned into a warm, sunny day. There was no shortage of beautifully prepared performance vehicles and their owners, all asking the same question: How much horsepower do I have?

"Horsepower" was coined by James Watt, who invented a new type of steam engine in the eighteenth century. Watt found that a horse could do a certain amount of work per second. That amount of work was defined as moving 550 pounds per second (later found to be equivalent to 746 watts). When he attempted to sell his steam engines, this measurement allowed him to estimate the worth of an engine in terms of the number of horses it would replace. Over the centuries the product has changed but the sales pitch remains, and is still just as effective.

Today there aren't many sports car adverts that don't boast the amount of horsepower their engine produces. Most sports car owners know from brochures how much horsepower their cars have, but would be shocked to find out how many of those ponies actually make it to the wheels. Confused? Wheel horsepower (whp) is the power output measured at the wheels. This is the information a Dyno Run provides and it usually reads around 15% less than the power measured at the engine (bhp or brake horsepower). This is because power is lost in the driveline (including clutch and transmission) and engine accessories. The Dyno Run can also tell you how efficiently your engine is running by analyzing the exhaust gas for lean, stoic, or rich fuel conditions.

Members who opted to test their cars had three runs. The results were then graphed and laminated on a printout. Some cars produced impressive numbers, shocking the onlookers and even their owners. Jonathan Vasquez of JVR performance hosted an amazing event and we look forward to having another "Dyno Day" and BBQ in the future.

Ramblings of a MINIac by Peter Burke

While warm weather isn't guaranteed with the arrival of Easter, there is one thing that is, the New York International Auto Show. I've mentioned it before here; it is a ritual I have

While there is talk in MINI circles as to why MINI wasn't there, the bottom line is that MINI missed out on an opportunity to present the new 4-door sedan as well as the new JCW F56 to a big fan base.

Two of the biggest hits at the show were the VW Golf R and the Ford Focus RS, as well as the next generation Swindon UKbuilt Civic, which will be coming to these shores. These cars are all serious competition for MINI, yet MINI was a no show. Meanwhile, at the Shanghai auto show in late April, MINI showed off its Mini Augmented Vision concept: specialized eyewear that projects a bunch of relevant information into the driver's view. Is this what MINI has become? Eyeglasses, no matter how smart, do not make a better car or a better driving experience. MINI did display the F56 JCW in Shanghai,

something that would have been nice to see at the Javits Center. Let's hope the boffins in Oxford, or I mean Munich have something up their sleeve to combat the increasing competition.

Meanwhile on the local scene, looks like we have a new addition to the MINI club scene. Matt Wayne, Assistant Manager of Sales at Habberstad MINI, who has led us on many a MINI adventure, has announced the formation of the Habberstad MINIacs. The structure of Habberstad MINIacs will be different than traditional clubs. The club will be a group effort, there will be no officers. There will be monthly events where having fun is a priority and driving is involved. Check the Habberstad MINI website for more information. The other MINI club on Long Island, USMINICLUB, held their annual MINIQ event May 3rd at Bethpage Park. A barbecue was

planned, as well as various activities such as MINI Bingo and a car show.

My wife is enrolled in a certificate program for botanical artists: a small, highly-skilled group who share some unusual traits and interests. Naturally, the artists are interested in one another as people, and as they walked together to the parking lot after class, one expressed some curiosity about what car my wife drove. She was surprised at the sight of

my wife's wheels, a 2005 Mini Cooper in primrose yellow. The car does not match my mate's personality. The Mini is showy and self-consciously cute: my daughter nicknamed it "The Little Drop of Sunshine". It is a car for an extrovert, which my wife is not. She quickly made it clear that she had nothing to do with selecting the car. In fact, I had bought it from a customer who sold it when it needed major engine work. Now fixed up, it has been my wife's daily driver for the last year or so. She enjoys the great handling, gas mileage and being able to park in tiny spaces. This more than compensates for the wildly inaccurate teeny-bopperesque image it conveys. This got me thinking about which cars make statements about their owners, and which do not. What they say is interesting; more interesting is how loudly and clearly they say it. I currently have five cars on the road, whose volumes span

The softest is a 1997 Subaru Outback wagon. I bought it, sight unseen and for a song, from an acquaintance with a blown engine (the car, not the acquaintance). I replaced the engine with a used one, fixed a few minor problems (including replacing the driver's seat with a BMW sport seat rescued from a flooded E30 325is; why the Japanese persist in fitting their cars with seats that utterly fail to fit my posterior is a wonder to me) and put it back on the road. The car has given us over 200,000 miles of reliable service. It not as prosaic as a Civic or Camry and a bit older than average, but because of its color (black), configuration (station wagon), condition (a little dinged up) and the large number of Subarus in these parts, it refuses to say anything meaningful about its owner's personality.

Next up the scale is a tie. The 1993 BMW wagon with the V12 that I've nattered on about before has few external signs that distinguish it. It is older than most BMWs now on the road and being a BMW enjoys a certain cachet, but a discerning eye is needed to see that it is lowered and sports Big Brakes. It does convey the owner's appreciation for Golden Era BMWs, but it isn't quite old enough to be thought a classic. Since I replaced the noisy performance exhaust ("Rorty!", the Englishman says) with an assertive but civilized M5 muffler, it no longer rattles windows. Rather it slides down the road in its sedate green skin, well under nearly everybody's radar. (Until I punch it. I'm ashamed and embarrassed to admit that shutting down poseurs is still fun.)

The wagon is in a tie with our gray 1982 VW pick-up. Similar to the subtle message of the BMWs "550" badge and large twin exhaust pipes, the Volkswagen's weirdness is clear to only a few.

Cognoscenti will recognize it as being a rare and adorable variant of the ubiquitous Rabbit of 1977–1984, but its only striking feature for most is its size, or lack thereof. I once pulled up next to a full-sized 4WD GMC pick-up. My roof line was even with the bottom of his passenger window. This tininess does turn heads from time to time, and people in the know have offered to buy it on the spot, but its prosaic color, pick-up shape and demure styling make it stand out less for plain folk than a hot red GTI.

I've already covered the Mini, the second-loudest car I own. I must clarify that although the Mini's remorselessly sunny affect is not a reflection of my wife or me, we are not dour and cranky. The next vehicle is proof of that, as it is the clarion call that trumpets our life philosophy to the world as fully as any object can do.

Yes, the "Little Miss Sunshine"-mobile, though ours has a camper interior, a top that lifts up and a door that doesn't fall off. This is the car that tells the world exactly who we are: people who

embrace what was good and beautiful and liberating in our adolescence, but are now adults responsible and capable enough to take care of this splendid relic and still use it for its intended purpose. We mosey along, at or below the speed limit, with our home on our back, use little gas, carry only what we need, see the world and spread joy by stirring up warm childhood memories in folks who rode in VW busses when they were young. A remarkable number of people, seeing our bus, have come up to us and told us their own bus stories. Most involve travel and camping as children or with their own kids, and how much they loved it, and how large a role the bus itself had in the experience. Tales are told of breakdowns, blown engines and the strange and wonderful people who crawled out of the scenery to help out. Some folk gaze wistfully at our bus, and think out loud about getting one again. No car is as clear an extension and reflection of its owners' personality as this one. Not many evoke an era as thoroughly as the bus, and few other cars have found a place in the hearts of so many people.

I trust the Subaru, enjoy the Rabbit, have fun in the Mini, get rocked silly by the BMW.

But I love the bus.
