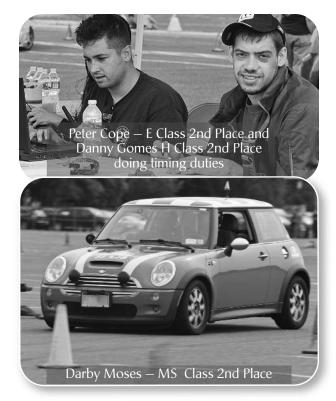
So once again, thanks to staff and volunteers for all their hard work before, during and after the event.

Happy holidays to everyone – hope to see you next year.

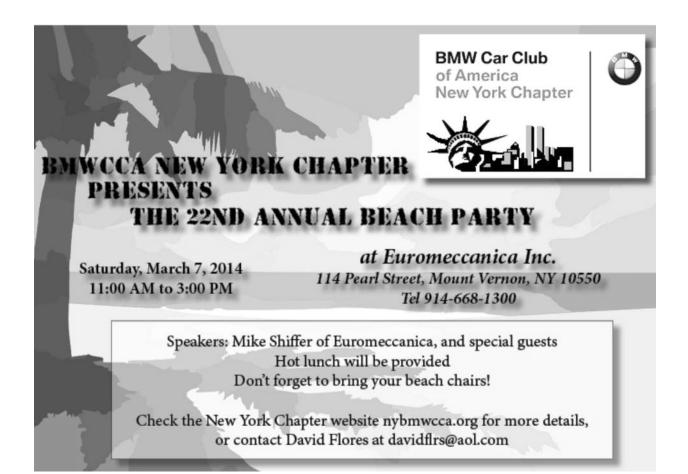

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Tech Talk with Mike Shiffer

There is a great deal of confusion about electricity and electronics which I will now clear up for everybody. Impress your family, friends, colleagues and enemies with this simple stunning statement: Electricity is about work; electronics is about information.

Next, you need to know how to explain and defend this. If you prefer to practice

Gertrude Stein's dictum, "Never apologize, never explain" and feel you can pull this off without cracking, ignore what follows. If not, read on.

Electricity is the movement of electrons. It is a form of energy. Both electrical and electronic systems use it. Work is energy doing something physical that we want it to do. E.g., if your wipers are working they are wiping your windshield. If they fail to wipe your windshield, they aren't working.

This should be all you need to know to make sense of the following.

Cars have had electrical systems almost as long as there have been cars. Ignition systems, lights, horns, wipers, fans and starters are just some of the electrically operated components found on virtually every car on the road today. The electricity is provided by a battery which is kept charged by an alternator. Each part that uses electricity converts it into work. A light bulb turns it into light (and heat); a motor turns it into rotary motion that can run a pump, windshield wipers, fan, starter, etc. A solenoid is an electromagnet which pulls or pushes a rod when energized. The rod can be attached to a valve and called a fuel injector, or it can throw a switch to get a much larger amount of electricity to the starter. Relays also use electromagnets to complete or break circuits by moving little plates which act as switches. Rear window defoggers turn electricity into heat. In every case, the source of power is electricity and the device converts the electricity to motion, light and/or heat: all different forms of work.

Electronics are also a part of virtually every car made in the last 35 years (longer if you count radios) and became vital with the move from carburetors to fuel injection in the 1980s. Nowadays, every BMW has literally dozens of electronic devices, and several discrete networks for them to talk to each other. Each device, control module, computer, sensor, switch, etc. has a specific job or set of jobs to do. What they all have in common is information: collecting it, passing it on in a form that can be understood by a microprocessor, taking the decision the microprocessor makes and converting it into a signal that can be read by the devices that need to know it, turning that signal into an electrical pulse which will run the motor, lamp, solenoid, etc. whose need has been determined by the microprocessor based on inputs and programming. Got that? Here's a simple example. When you step on the brake, a switch on the brake pedal closes, which sends a message to the lamp module. The module reads the message, then turns on the brake lights. When the brake pedal is released, the switch opens and the module responds by shutting off the brake lights. So why use electronics? What's wrong with powering up the brake lights directly from the switch like in the good old days? Well here's what else goes on electronically when you step on the brakes. The lamp module is measuring the power use of the brake light circuit. If the current draw is out of range, the module will turn a warning light on to let the driver know there is a bulb failure in the brake circuit. It can also substitute another bulb for the burnt out one (usually does this with turn signals). The cruise control module is receiving the brake pedal signal too. It will disengage cruise control the moment it senses brake application. The transmission control module is also in the loop, along with the starter inhibit module. The transmission control will alter its shift strategy if you are on the brakes and won't allow you to shift out of park if you aren't, and the starter will not be allowed to engage on some cars if the brake pedal isn't pressed. The anti-lock/skid control module is also in the loop, for obvious reasons.

There is only one set of skinny wires from the brake switch to the wiring harness. It talks directly to only one of the control modules. That module is networked to all the others and shares this information with everybody who needs to know it. One of the arguments for using electronics is, ironically, simplicity. Sensors and switches can pass their information on thin wires, saving weight by shortening the runs of the heavier wires needed to carry the electricity that does the actual work. The switches and sensors themselves are smaller and lighter than old-fashioned ones that switched the components directly.

To recap, electrical components are the ones that do the actual work. Electronic components gather information, convey the info to microprocessors, then take the decisions made and convert those signals into electrical power to get the



appropriate electrical components to work.

As a reward for getting this far, here's a shot of a BMW with no electronics at all.

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
