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


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
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#### BMW and the Internet V2.0

BMW AG has been hard at work to use the power of the Internet


to spread their corporate message. They launched a new site to correspond with the IAA 2007, the famous international car show in Frankfurt held in September. Their new site is akin to the youtube of BMW. There is also a site, entirely in German, that I recently found that has all kinds of wonderful in depth information about all models of BMW. It comes in text, pictures, and videos. When I need to look up a part for my E39 or E28s, I found an incredible source of information for all BMWs, new and old. 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## Bangle Butt my A\*\*! - By Alvin Baugh



Has "Bangle Butt" got you down? Does "Flame Surfacing" scare you? You are not alone. Whatever happened to classic BMW style, grace, and pace that kept a smile on your face? It seems that BMW has lost its way a bit – it's still got the pace, but the style and grace seem to be lacking.

I remember when BMW had it all. I've loved BMWs since I was a child walking with my Dad back in 1972 down Beverley Road in Brooklyn when I came upon an Inka Orange BMW 2002tii. I'd never seen anything like it before. That color – that stubby shifter with its accordion boot caught my eye – with its compact size, squat stance, wrapped in a simple yet classic body style that spoke to me. From that day forward I was hooked! BMWs became my passion, much to my muscle-car-loving father's chagrin. Dad had taken me to the NY Auto Show every year since I was a boy, and I've been attending ever since. The first display I'd always visit was the BMW stand. However, since the onslaught of "Bangle Butt" and "Flame Surfacing", I still get there, but at a bit slower pace now.

When Dad was looking for a replacement for his beloved Betsy, a 1967 Jetstar 88 with a 455 Rocket engine, we attended the 1973 New York Auto Show. The precocious little boy that I was begged Dad to buy a BMW Bavaria. It had everything I'd loved about the 2002, just more of it – more power, more interior room, more amenities, and room for our family of 5. I reminded Dad about Road and Track's comparison test that said "The BMW's character is decidedly sporty. Each of its 170 horses had less poundage to carry than those of the other two cars (Jaguar XJ6, Mercedes 280), and has a relatively raucous exhaust system. It's the only one of the three cars that can be had with a manual gearbox in the U.S. It's also the lightest of the three ... with a styling of the no-nonsense variety. Its sporty image does not detract from its transportation value – indeed, it's as roomy as the Mercedes and the easiest of the three to get in

and out of, has a large trunk (and a particularly well finished one) and offers most of the comfort and convenience items to be found as optional or standard in the others".

Dad smiled as we walked toward the car. He got behind the wheel, with me running around to my usual shotgun position. Dad looked over and smiled some more. I was smiling too, ear to ear, but my smile soon turned around. "I like it, it's just a little plain, Son, and a bit too small for us." I was crushed! Fast forward 30 years and now it's time for me to replace my awesome 1985 Alfa GTV6 with something I've wanted for a long time. The search was on; I was Indiana Jones in search of my Holy Grail. Only now Indiana had a new side kick – thy name is Google.

I googled "BMW Bavaria" and up pops "The BMW Bavaria Defense Mechanism" website. I read that site like it was the word of a Higher Power. My new Bible would lead me to what I sought. Now it was on to eBay — nothing. Car Buyers Market — zero. Specialty Car Marketplace — nada. What's going on here? No Bavarias anywhere! I had to keep googling, and I finally came upon Roadfly.com — Jackpot! A 1972 BMW Bavaria, Agave Green, 34,000 miles, 4 speed manual transmission, fully independent suspension, 4 wheel disc brakes, twin 2-barrel carbs atop a 3-litre in-line six cylinder engine, sunroof, and an Alpine AM/FM Cassette 4 speaker stereo with an ADS trunk mounted amplifier powering 4 speakers. I had to have it, so I called the owner immediately to set up a meeting. The car was beautiful, repainted 9 years ago, and garaged its whole life. The interior was straight out of 1972 — no rips or tears — all the wood was in perfect condition. In a word: awesome!

We held an exchange of monies for the title and maintenance records back to its original purchase date, and I was on my way back to Brooklyn from Connecticut. On the drive down the Saw Mill River Parkway's long



sweeping turns, tight curves, and interspersed stop lights, the Bavaria tracked straight as a laser scope on a 44 Magnum. It had power from idle right up to the 6200rpm redline, and those obese – for 1972 – 215/60HR/14 BF Goodrich tires hugged the curves with the tenacity of Velcro. When those pesky stoplights would pop up at the end of a sweeping high speed curve, the brakes showed their mettle, figuratively and literally, hauling my 3100-pound baby down to full stop like a powerful husky obeying his master's commands. I couldn't believe that this 1972 BMW drove as well as modern cars, was so fast, and fulfilled the dreams and imaginations of my childhood. But I soon found out there were a few flies in this Bavarian's salve. With a little patience from a great mechanic, who cleaned up the cancerous gas tank, unclogged the fuel lines, cleaned the dirty carbs, added a low temp thermostat, flushed and refilled the radiator, and popped in a new distributor, the "Green Mamba" is now



as reliable as any new BMW, but with more style, grace, if not precisely the same pace. The Bavaria has carried me to Lime Rock Park for the Rolex Vintage Festival twice, to Watkins Glen for the Zippo U.S. Vintage Grand Prix/Tour de Marque, and to the Vintage at the Vineyard held at the Westbend Vineyard in Lewisville, North Carolina. The Bavaria even made it to BMW's Museum and manufacturing plant in Spartanburg, South Carolina.

I hope my experience buying, fixing, and driving my 1972 BMW Bavaria has infected you. Maybe a Bavaria lights your fire like it does mine. Could a 1971 2800CS coupe get the embers of your BMW lust smoldering? I've got one of them too. Perhaps the iconic '73 2002tii, or '87 635csi, or '83 733i, or '95 325i, or 2000 BMW 540 Sport, might surely do it for you. Whatever older BMW styling speaks to you, buy it and drive it. Maybe we can all meet up and drive to BMW's US head-quarters in N.J. and remind them what their cars are supposed to look like! So don't fret about Bangle Butt or Flame Surfacing − do something about it − get out there and hunt for your own Ultimate Driving Machine − one with the classic style, grace, and pace that once was, and may be the hallmark of every BMW. ❖





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

This photo is from a roadside public service campaign by the German Federal Ministry of Traffic. It was launched back in 2003 to emphasize the problem of "distracted driving". This has been a plague on their roads since mobile phones ballooned in popularity in the late 1990s. The Germans had instituted a law to prohibit the use of hand-held cell phones as far back as March 2001. Their mobile phone law is very strict — hand-helds may only be used when the engine is off, and even hands-free devices may be used only when conditions allow it (i.e. not complicated traffic). But the distractions keep piling up and exacerbating the problem. On the autobahns of Germany, where speeds can regularly exceed 125mph (200kph) on non-restricted sections, it is hard to imagine that some drivers still believe it is acceptable to allow themselves to become distracted. Of course, all good Germans know that they should be concentrating on the task at hand — passing on the left, watching for the BMWs, Benzes, and Porsches in their rear-view mirror, and moving to the right after passing. In this public service campaign, they're not singling out mobile phones as the culprit. They're pointing out that distractions come in many flavors — smoking, eating, and playing with gadgets — and asks drivers to examine their priorities by asking the question: Since your attention is diverted because of these distractions, who is doing the driving?

One can easily find numerous studies over the decades to highlight the undeniable problem of distracted driving. People have

been smoking in cars since the car was invented — yes, cigarettes were invented long before the automobile. We have been fiddling with our car radios since they were invented in the USA in 1930. We have been eating in our cars since the drive-through restaurant was invented in the USA in the 1940s. We have been engaging in risky sexual behavior while driving since it, too, was invented in the USA in the 1950s. And of course, driving with one's knee in order to — continued on p16

smoke from a bong was invented by Cheech and Chong in the 1970s. I believe Cheech was born in Los Angeles, while Tommy was born in Canada. But close enough. My point is: The United States of America invented distractions. The USA is the birthplace of distractions and we lead the world in finding revolutionary new ways to become distracted behind the wheel.

Mobile phones are made the scapegoat because as a telephone, they are usually in the hand of the driver that is using them - which we can plainly see. And if we can see them, we know that at least one of the driver's hands is not on the steering wheel. With one hand on the steering wheel, who knows where their attention is? Some "clever" motorists think that in order to comply with the current law, they can use their speakerphones, or push-to-talk features, and this satisfies the hands free law. Well, whether it does or doesn't, their driving is still impaired by the distraction. I've always found the "hands-free" aspect of the law in the USA to be somewhat silly. Whether hand-held or hands-free, many phone users — those who don't have integrated Bluetooth in their BMWs — must take their eyes off the road to navigate poorly designed address books on crappy phones, send SMS messages, or redial dropped calls thanks to crappy service providers. It's those few consecutive seconds of inattention to traffic conditions that can kill.

Anyone who has driven an automobile has allowed themselves to be

distracted at some point. And it is an absolute certainty that we will allow ourselves to be distracted while driving tomorrow and then again the next day. But the lesson here is about mitigating risks and understanding the consequences of ignoring risk. I will freely admit that I speed on the highway and that there is some small risk in doing that. But I never speed in residential neighborhoods, and certainly don't compound the risk by taking on additional risks while speeding. It is when we multiply risks — conversations, drinking, playing with I-Drive and the iPod — that we significantly increase the likelihood that we will experience an accident. A person who is paying close attention while exceeding the speed limit on the highway is a lesser danger on the road than someone who considers driving their 3rd or 4th priority while behind the wheel around town. Nonetheless, once we consider the risks we take, we can manage them better, and possibly become safer drivers.

The future holds many challenges, and it isn't too far off. Through voice commands that will be accepted by our car's computer and transferred to computer systems at home and at work, we will be able to control appliances remotely, read and respond to emails remotely, conduct business remotely, and perform tasks that make our current set of available distractions seem downright benign. I suppose those "Intelligent Transportation Systems" might not be such a bad idea after all — at least we'll have a honest answer to the question: "...and who is driving:"— but for the other cars, not for our BMWs. I'm not quite ready to give up The Joy of Driving!



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#### Technology Insights www.bimmernav.com

The audio system of a six-year-old BMW seems archaic, especially when compared to the Logic 7 digital audio system in the new BMW body style. The new BMWs also offer features such as auxiliary audio input (AUX), MP3 playback, and Sirius Satellite Radio. If you spend much time driving a car, you might wonder how you ever lived without these great features. Armed with the right information, you can correctly upgrade AUX, MP3, and Sirius support in your older BMW and have it operate exactly as it would in a new BMW.

To demonstrate these technology upgrades, we will focus on a 2001 5 Series E39 with navigation. The 2001 model was selected because it was manufactured just prior to when BMW switched from the Alpine trunk-mounted navigation radio to the Becker version, which has a slightly different radio connector. Despite this difference, it is still quite simple to retrofit a 2001 E39 with AUX, MP3 support, and BMW Sirius Satellite Radio. Initially, it requires upgrading the trunk-mounted radio for the AUX and Sirius Satellite support as well as upgrading the trunk-mounted navigation computer to the DVD MKIV for proper display of the MP3 and Sirius audio text on the navigation screen.

You can address the connector difference between the older Alpine and newer Becker radio by purchasing adapter harnesses from your BMW dealer. There are a few tricks for getting the wiring correct that are detailed on www. bimmernav.com/sirius.html, but overall, it is a simple and quick task in the E39. The navigation radio model year is the crucial component, with the newer radios supporting the most features. Look for a 2006 X5 or E46 replacement radio for the most features. Once you upgrade the radio, you can easily add the other components to your E39 just by plugging them in. Now that your radio has additional modes, displaying this information properly requires upgrading the navigation computer.

Upgrading the navigation comptuer is a simple plug and play. In the 2001 E39 equipped with the CD navigation computer, you can simply remove the older and slower CD-based system and replace it with the newer and faster DVD-based MKIV navigation computer. Upgrading the navigation computer provides you with a new 3D Map viewing, DVD map of all US and Canada, and it will also display the information on your navigation screen correctly for Sirius, MP3, and AUX.

Starting in 2006, BMW introduced a new CD changer that plays MP3s and can support MP3 ID3 Audiotext on the navigation display. Upgrading to the new CD changer with MP3 support is a simple plug and play. The CD Changer will play MP3s correctly using the old radio and navigation computer, but in order to display ID3 Audiotext, you need the upgraded radio and nav components.



Now you can make calls without taking your hands off the wheel. Our latest generation BMW Bluetooth retrofit kits allow you to:

- Automatically connect to your Bluetooth-equipped cellular phone via the BMW stereo and steering wheel controls
- **Provide voice control** of your cellular phone and navigation system (if equipped)
- Offer safety and convenience

Whitestone or Throgs Neck Bridge onto Cross Island Parkway Southbound. Proceed to Southern State Parkway Eastbound to Exit 13. South on Central Avenue. Central Avenue changes to Mill Road after crossing Sunrise Highway Proceed to end of Mill Road, and then make left on West Broadway. Left on Broadway for 2 traffic lights.
